From the Gospel of Matthew 20: 1-16

)) For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, "You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, "Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, "Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, "You also go into the vineyard. When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, "Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.'

Then those who were hired about five o'clock came to the vineyard, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when they first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saving, "These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat. But he replied to one of them, "Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

This Gospel reading from Matthew at the outset might be a little hard to take, and maybe a little annoying, the landowner hires different people at different times of the day and the workers all work different amounts of time. At the end of the day, the landowner pays them all the same wage! How is that fair? Think about it... if you worked for eight hours straight in the fields, that's hard work. But the next guy worked one hour and got the same pay? HUH??

This is a parable that always annoyed me. What do you mean all the workers got paid the same? Well, this is a parable told by Jesus! And what is a parable?

parable is a simple story illustrating a moral or religious lesson. Jesus told a lot of these, and this parable is in response to Peter's question in <u>Matthew 19:27</u>: "We have left everything to follow you! What then will there be for us?" Peter wanted to know what reward would be given to those who give up everything to follow Jesus. In response, Jesus explains this truth about the kingdom of heaven.

Think about this, planting, maintaining and harvesting vineyards back in first-century Israel was strenuous work requiring hard physical labor in the heat of summer. The owner of this particular vineyard went to the marketplace at 6 in the morning to find workers for the day. He offered the wage of one denarius, at the time the equivalent of a Roman's soldier's pay for a day. The workers in the first group were more than happy to work for the generous wage.

s the day progressed and more workers were hired, the specific wage was not mentioned, but the landowner promised to pay "whatever is right." Apparently, the workers were sufficiently confident of the landowner's character that they took him at his word. Altogether, four groups of workers were hired, the last group just one hour before the end of the day. When the time came for the wages to be paid, the first group of workers saw the last group being paid a denarius and were naturally thinking they would be paid more since they had worked the longest. Their anger against the landowner spilled forth when they saw they would all be paid the same, even though they got exactly what they had agreed upon when they were hired. The landowner was forced to defend his actions to the first group, even though he had dealt with them in perfect fairness according to the contract.

The landowner, whose decision to pay all the workers the same was an act of mercy—not injustice—represents God, whose grace and mercy are

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shed abundantly upon those of His choosing.

can also relate this parable to all of us here at ■ Bethany Congregational Church of East Rockaway. We are a small, but very active group. Being small, all of us are all called upon to wear many hats. I know, I have worn a bunch. The person who does more in the church, because they feel they have to, will receive the same reward as the person who cannot because of their personal situation and we have to respect that. One of the traits we must look for in searching for our new pastor is a person that can go into the community and inspire people to join our church. And with that, we must inspire people to join us by the example we set in the world.

can relate my own story of how my family learned about Bethany Church because as the family legend goes, Reverend Macudary was walking down Fifth Avenue in his straw hat and invited the three Donovan boys to Sunday School. Can that still be done today? I hope so and we need a new pastor who can do that, and by example we need to do the same thing. Mention Bethany Church to the new neighbors, invite them to HurriCon on November 18th, tell them about the Thrift shop. We need to get the word out that Bethany is a welcoming place.

Thether God calls someone early or late in life to partake of His grace, the glory and praise for our salvation is His and His alone and in no way amounts to unfairness. Just as the landowner has a right to do what he wishes with his own money, so does God have the right to have mercy

on whom He will have mercy. The first group of workers in the vineyard resented receiving the same wage as the last group. Their attitude was similar to that of the Pharisees, who were incensed at Jesus' teaching that others could inherit a heavenly kingdom they thought was reserved for them alone. They despised Jesus for offering the kingdom to the poor.

The message in verse 16, "the last will be first, and the first last," is that no matter how long or how hard a believer works during his lifetime, the reward of eternal life will be the same given to all. The thief on the cross with Jesus at the end, whose life of service was limited to a moment of repentance and confession of faith in Christ, received the same reward of eternal life as the apostle Paul.

The rest of the workers received their wages without complaint or envy of others. In the same way, as Christians, we should rejoice when others come to the Savior, as we should rejoice in the service others render to Him. He is faithful to reward us for our service as He has promised, and how He rewards others should be of no consequence to us, nor should it affect our devotion to Him.

The story of the Magi as told in Matthew goes like this. After the birth of Jesus, wise men from the East, (perhaps astrologers), came to Jerusalem inquiring the whereabouts of the new king of the Jews whose star they had observed and followed. Right. The Magi went on their way, found the child, gave gifts and worshipped him. Fortunately, they were warned in a dream about King Herod's true intention and made a crucial choice. They returned to their homes by a different route, ignoring the worldly dictates of Herod. Phew, thank goodness!

Great story, right? But what does this have to do with us in our day and age? Well, those Magi recognized something special. They fixed their eyes upon that star, the Christ Star, and did not turn away. They did not do so looking for political favors or recognition. Instead, they sacrificed (expensive gifts), payed homage and worshipped.

o, my friends, what star will we fix our eyes upon in 2025? Where will our journey take us? Will we get detoured by desires for wealth, fame, reward, recognition? Will our desire for attention thwart our pure objectives? The reports of the Magi do not show them filled with self-importance; quite the opposite. "This Is Why Poinsettias Are the Official Christmas Flower" By Claire Nowak, Readers Digest

There's no denying that poinsettias make bright, festive decorations during winter months. But they're native to Central America, particularly southern Mexico, and they're actually colorful leaves, not flowers. So why do we consider them the official Christmas flowers anyway?

The reason we associate poinsettias with the holidays comes from an old Mexican legend. A young girl named Pepita was sad that she didn't have a gift to leave for the baby Jesus at Christmas Eve services. Her cousin tried to comfort her and said that Jesus would love any present from her, even the smallest one. With no money to buy a real gift, Pepita picked a bouquet of weeds that she walked past on the way to church. (Other versions of the story say an angel came to her and instructed her to pick the plants.) When she got there, she left the weeds at the bottom of the nativity scene. All of a sudden, the weeds transformed into beautiful red flowers.

rom that day on, they became known as "Flores de Noche Buena," or "Flowers of the Holy Night."

Poinsettias get their American name from Joel Roberts Poinsett, the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico, who brought them to the states from Mexico in the early 1800s. They didn't become traditional holiday decorations until the entrepreneurial Ecke family started promoting them a century later. Paul Ecke Jr. sent free poinsettia plants to TV studios across the country, including "The Tonight Show" and Bob Hope's holiday specials. Eventually, the trend caught on, and now poinsettias are among the most popular plants sold in the U.S. Congress even declared December 12 to be National Poinsettia Day, the anniversary of Poinsett's death.

et's talk about Bethany. Let's talk about how impressed I am with the entire congregation. When we stand in front of you and we ask for help, you guys just show up and say we're here...let me help. It is truly the way.

ow, what's going on in our small but powerful Church? Prioritizing what needs to get done can be difficult but having a board that focuses on our needs and helps guide me as to what needs to be done is truly amazing. I just want to give you an idea of how I come up with what needs to be done. I start by discussing and these discussions can go on for up to a year, if it's a big project and we basically break it down and we figure out the best way to handle the problem at hand. Once we get to a solution, it's a matter of paying for it. That could be difficult. If we have somebody in our congregation who is an expert we ask for help and, amazingly, the project starts. Also, while this discussion is going on we start saving to be able to finish the project and complete it. This can be frustrating for people who are not at the meetings when I talk about certain things and they don't see any progress but they have to understand we don't have the funds available yet to be able to do a certain project but by keeping it fresh and talking about the project we never lose sight of our goal.

The parsonage is finished except for some gardening that needs to be done. The parking lot has been repaired and this will give us another two (2) years to save some more money to rip up the old parking lot, fix the draining cisterns and lay down new asphalt. The gutters have all been completed. We are in the beginning stages of putting an electric sign facing the CVS parking lot. We have a good plan and we should have it completed sometime in February or early spring. We are looking at a new type of paint it is an acrylic paint that can go over all the old paint making this job a little easier and less expensive. It is a very high priority to make sure that our church will have better curb appeal. This will also probably happen in the early spring. We have some large branches that need to be trimmed and we're looking at that also.

Financially, we're hanging tight...okay not great but not bad. That is the Bethany way. I want to thank everybody! Let's keep up the good work.

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
